At a glance

The 2021 EU Health Award will recognise and reward initiatives of cities, NGOs or other civil society organisations, and educational institutions seeking to promote communication and health literacy on cancer prevention among children and young people (from 6 to 24 years old).

Applications submitted under the 2021 EU Health Award must have started and been put into practice in 2020 and/or 2021.

Initiatives could include actions promoting healthy diets and regular physical activity, discouraging the use of tobacco products and alcohol, reducing (online) marketing of unhealthy products, enabling a supportive environment and protection from exposure to sunlight. A special focus should be on reaching and involving children and young people from socio-economic disadvantaged population groups including migrants, ethnic minorities, etc., and/or children living with disabilities.



Who is eligible?

Cities, NGOs or other civil society organisations, and educational institutions established in any EU Member State (find more information in the 2021 EU Health Award website).



The winners

Prizes for each category (cities, NGOs and educational institutions) are:

First winner: EUR 30 000 Second winner: EUR 20 000 Third winner: EUR 12 000



In addition, three shortlisted initiatives per category will each be awarded a certificate and EUR 1500.
